To Our Visitors: Welcome! Please join us after the service for coffee, conversation, and church school for the children. If you would, fill out a visitor's card for us and leave it in the basket on the table by the door. Be aware that shortly after the sermon, the catechumens will be dismissed, but you are invited to stay for the rest of the service.

To All: Please be aware that Holy Communion is open only to Orthodox Christians who have prepared themselves for worthy participation in the Mystery through prayer, fasting, and a recent confession to a priest (within the last month or so). If we are visiting from another parish, we should know that proper church etiquette is to contact the priest ahead of time if we wish to receive Holy Communion so he doesn't have to question us as to our identity in the Communion line. We should be modestly dressed and present to hear "Blessed is the Kingdom" at the beginning of the Liturgy (in *unusual* circumstances no later than the Gospel reading), and not leave until the dismissal at the end.

Please Move Forward during the Liturgy! **Please be quiet** in the Narthex afterwards while the Prayers of Thanksgiving after Communion are being read in the church.

The Special Offering this week is for our building fund.

Church School meets today following the Divine Liturgy. Please let the children and teachers go through the coffee hour line first.

From Saint Maximus

Impurity of mind means first to have false knowledge; next to be ignorant of any of the universals—I speak of the human mind, since an angel is not ignorant of particular things; thirdly, in having passionate thoughts; and fourthly, in consenting to sin.

Impurity of soul means not acting in accordance to nature, for from this are begotten passionate thoughts in the mind. Now it acts in accord with nature when it sensitive drives, that is, anger and concupiscence, remain free of passion under the assault of material things and the representations they bring.

Impurity of body is a sin in deed.

The one who is not affected by the things of the world loves solitude; the one who does not love anything human loves all men; and the one who takes no offense at anyone, either because of faults or suspicious thoughts, possesses the knowledge of God and of divine realities.

It is a great thing not to be affected by things; but it is far better to remain detached from their representations [i.e. thoughts in mind].

Love and self-mastery keep the mind detached from things and from their representations.
