Holy Transfiguration, one of the Twelve Great Feasts, is celebrated this Saturday, August 6, commemorating Christ's manifestation of His Divine glory to three of His disciples in a preview of the glory which shall be ours in the Resurrection. We do well to keep the feast by attending Vigil Friday evening at 7:00 and Liturgy Saturday morning at 9:30, or at least as much of those services as we possibly can attend.

From Saint Maximus

The man who still loves empty fame, or is attached to some material object, is naturally vexed with people on account of transitory things, or harbors rancor or hatred against them, or is a slave to shameful thoughts. Such things are quite foreign to the soul that loves God.

If you have no thought of any shameful word or action in your mind, harbor no rancor against someone who has injured or slandered you, and, while praying, always keep your intellect free from mater and form, you may be sure that you have attained the full measure of dispassion and perfect love.

It is no small struggle to be freed from self-esteem. Such freedom is to be attained by the inner practice of the virtues and by more frequent prayer; and the sign that you have attained it is that you no longer harbor rancor against anyone who abuses or has abused you.

If you want to be a just person, assign to each aspect of yourself-to your soul and your body—what accords with it. To the intelligent aspect of the soul assign spiritual reading, contemplation, and prayer; to the incensive [power to be angry and hate], spiritual love, the opposite of hatred; to the desiring aspect, moderation and self-control; to the fleshly part, food and clothing, for these alone are necessary.

Resurrectional Troparion, tone 6

The angelic powers were <u>at</u> Thy tomb / and the guards became as <u>dead</u> men, / Mary <u>stood</u> by Thy grave, / seeking Thine immaculate <u>body</u>, / Thou didst despoil hell, not being <u>tempted</u> by it, / Thou didst go to meet the Virgin <u>granting</u> life, / O Lord, who didst <u>rise</u> from the dead, / <u>glory</u> to Thee.

Elevation of the Cross, Troparion tone 1

O <u>Lord</u>, save Thy <u>people</u> / and bless Thine in<u>her</u>itance. / <u>Grant</u> victory to Orthodox <u>Chris</u>tians / over the <u>en</u>emy; / <u>and</u> by Thy <u>Cross</u> / preserve <u>Thine</u> estate.

As Thou wast voluntarily <u>cruc</u>ified for our sake, / so grant mercy, O Christ God, to those who are <u>called</u> by Thy name; / make all Orthodox Christians glad by Thy <u>power</u>, / granting them victories over the <u>enemy</u>, / by bestowing on them the invincible trophy, Thy <u>weap</u>on of peace.
