To Our Visitors: Welcome! Please join us after the service for coffee and conversation. If you would, fill out a visitor's card for us and leave it in the basket on the table by the door.

To All: Please be aware that Holy Communion is open only to Orthodox Christians who have prepared themselves for worthy participation in the Mystery through prayer, fasting, and a recent confession to a priest (within the last month or so). We should be modestly dressed (so as not to distract others) and present to hear "Blessed is the Kingdom" at the beginning of the Liturgy (in *unusual* circumstances no later than the Gospel reading), and not leave until the dismissal at the end.

Church School meets today after Liturgy.

Civil Thanksgiving will be observed with a Thanksgiving Liturgy at 8:00 a.m. (also the Feast of St. Katherine) after Matins at 7:00. Traditionally, Abp. Dmitri gave a blessing not to keep the fast on this day, especially for those who will be celebrating with non-Orthodox relatives. Leftovers may be frozen for Nativity or given to non-Orthodox relatives and friends or to those in need.

The Nativity Fast

We keep the forty-day Nativity Fast by prayer, fasting, and almsgiving for our spiritual benefit: for repentance, healing, cleansing, growth that we may know Christ more intimately and partake more fully of His life in the Holy Spirit. We abstain from meat, dairy products, fish, wine, and oil (see wall calendar for when fish, wine, and oil are permitted) and marital relations so that we can give ourselves to prayer and spiritual reading and have extra means for almsgiving.
