We should be modestly dressed (so as not to distract others) and present to hear "Blessed is the Kingdom" at the beginning of the Liturgy (in *unusual* circumstances no later than the Gospel reading), and not leave until the dismissal at the end.

## The Fast: Fourth Week

We abstain from meat, meat products, dairy, fish, wine (alcohol), oil. If fasting strictly, we take one meal a day M-F after 3 p.m. or after the Presanctified Liturgy. We join increased prayer and almsgiving to our fasting and cut back on (or cut out) all things that distract us unnecessarily from Christ. This week of the Cross should be kept more strictly than the last two, if possible.

## From Saint Maximus

If all the saints had their share of discipline, we too should thank God that we are disciplined with them, so that we may be found worthy to partake of their glory. 'For whom the Lord loves He disciplines; He chastens every son He accepts.'

When Adam accepted the sensual pleasure offered to him by Even, who had come from his side, he expelled humanity form paradise. But when the Lord in His agony was pierced in his side by the lance, He brought the robber into paradise. Let us, then, love the suffering of the flesh and hate its pleasure; for the first brings us in and restores God's blessings to us, while the second drives us out and separates us from those blessings.

First Century of Various Texts, 22, 23

#### From Saint Ignatius Brianchaninov

The Lord's commandments are "Spirit and life." They save the doer of them. They restore a dead soul to life. They make a carnal and worldly person spiritual. On the other hand, a person who neglects the commandments ruins himself and remains in a carnal and worldly state, in a fallen condition, and develops the fall in himself.

True Christianity and true monasticism consists in the practice of the commandments of the Gospel. Where this practice is absent, there is neither Christianity nor monasticism, whatever the outward appearance may be.

One who practises the commandments of the Gospel is always immersed in humility. Comparing the loftiness and purity of the holy commandments with his own fulfillment of them, he constantly admits that his efforts are extremely unsatisfactory and unworthy of God. He sees himself meriting temporal and eternal punishments for his sins, for his unbroken fellowship with Satan, for the fall that is common to all men, for his own continuance in a fallen state, and finally for his insufficient and frequently fickle fulfillment of the commandments. Whatever trouble or suffering comes his way by the ordering of Divine Providence, he submissively bows his head, knowing that, by means of suffering, God trains and educates His servants during their earthly pilgrimage. He is kind and merciful to his enemies and prays for them as brothers...who are spiritually sick, as his benefactors, and as instruments of the providence of God.

By Thy <u>Cross</u> Thou didst de<u>stroy</u> death. / To the thief Thou didst open <u>Pa</u>radise. / For the <u>myrrh</u>-bearers Thou didst change their lamentation into joy. / And Thou didst command Thine Apostles, O <u>Christ</u> God, / to proclaim that Thou art <u>risen</u>, / granting unto the <u>world</u> great <u>mercy</u>.

### Sunday of the Cross, Troparion, tone 1

O <u>Lord</u>, save Thy <u>people</u> / and bless Thine in<u>her</u>itance. / <u>Grant</u> victory to Orthodox <u>Christians</u> / over the <u>enemy</u>; / <u>and</u> by Thy <u>Cross</u> / preserve <u>Thine</u> estate.

### Kontakion of the Third Sunday of Lent, tone 7
